Trustees' Report for the Annual General Meeting, 20 March 2022

Despite the ongoing upheaval caused by COVID-19 the MBNZT has managed to keep on track and continue its worthwhile work – even embarking on a new initiative. We hear much positive feedback for our magazine, our professional website and the completion of our projects.

Vision

Our vision is to ensure that New Zealand's ecosystems support thriving moth and butterfly populations.

Mission

To engage with New Zealanders to ensure our biodiversity promotes a thriving moth and butterfly population.

Outreach

Jacqui has continued to promote our aims and activities, explaining the importance of our Lepidoptera species. This past year many school and garden club visits have been rescheduled due to COVID-19 restrictions, but where she has managed to present, we always hear positive comments about her presentations. It's amazing how many more people are now planting stinging nettle for the admirals! A broken ankle and then later another accident affecting her mobility has kept her unable to drive and indoors for much of the year but she has continued to fight the good fight from her desk.

Despite this we are very proud of a new initiative: a butterfly house in the grounds of Mercy Hospice in Auckland CBD. Mercy Hospice is set in magnificent parklike grounds and a butterfly house has provided another beautiful, peaceful feature for contemplation and respite. We particularly want to thank our member, Michael, who has tended to the caterpillars and plants (and aphids and wasps) throughout the summer.

Our membership numbers continue to rise – we now have over 500, about half of whom receive the magazine in the mail, with the others reading it on-line. We are always keen to find new members so if you have any ideas, please talk with Jacqui who will be delighted to give you some back copies of magazines and/or brochures.

Our Facebook and Instagram pages continue to be very popular, and thanks to the assistance of Aashna Rahi who volunteers her time as 'social media butterfly', the material continues to be informative, interactive and professional. The free e-news goes out most Fridays and is always well received.

A very special thank you to Jacqui and the team for all their hard work and dedication.

We are also very fortunate to have the extremely able Carol Stensness managing the accounts, and her assistant, Surbhi Gupta. And there are several other volunteers too who help out in many ways. Thank you all – we couldn't manage without you.

Publications

Four 16-page, seasonal magazines, full colour, have been produced over the past twelve months. They are always interesting and it is wonderful to see the work being done in schools and communities.

Forest Ringlet Project

We have continued our work to protect the forest ringlet (*Dodonidia helmsii*) ably led by Norm Twigge and Hugh Smith, both in the Bay of Plenty, and from our office. The forest ringlet, an endemic forest species, is extraordinarily beautiful and also at risk. It is not only rare but the only species in the genus *Dodonidia*. Hugh and Norm will vouch for just how rare it is!

We were thankful that Lottery NZ extended the grant period which helped us better utilise the funds they gave us. We are learning more about it all of the time, and their funds has been a huge benefit to the project.

Transects and MLMP

We are encouraging more people to walk transects and to become involved in the [Monarch Larva Monitoring Project](#) with our American colleagues. We plan to promote both of these projects more over the next year.

National Butterfly Centre

Our plans for the development of the National Butterfly Centre/Te Matauranga o nga Pūrerehua o Aotearoa are still in mind. Work on the site next to the Auckland Museum has been understandably hampered by COVID-19 and the Auckland Council having to put a hold on all major projects. We will continue to consult with local organisations as well as iwi. Auckland Council recognises 19 iwi authorities. Whanaungatanga, or building relationships through sharing experiences and working together, provides a strong basis for an intercultural Auckland. If you would like to be involved, we could certainly use more people who are skilled in community liaison.

Funding

We are thankful to funders such as the [Auckland Council Community Co-ordination Fund](#), [Foundation North](#), the [Lion Foundation](#) and [Lottery](#) for their generous grants over the past year which have boosted our projects. We are very grateful to our financial members who not only get to enjoy our magazine but also buy our products from the website and on-line shop.

Our plant sales or sales of cuttings have been very successful to date and we will continue to do these so long as it fits with COVID-19 protocols and legislation.
